2017 LOVE OFFERING FOR MISSIONS



The Money Pot (located in the church lobby) welcomes your donations to help support the offering of the month. May's money will support the **Love Offering for Missions**; donations for this cause are gathered within Minnesota United Methodist churches and delivered to annual conference session, to be received at session on June 20. The offering benefits international, national, and Minnesota missions. The conference Missions Promotion Team determines the annual recipients.

Donations to the 2016 Love Offering totaled more than \$96,000. The Minnesota Council of Churches Refugee Services received 40 percent of that total, the United Methodist Committee on Relief received 10 percent to cover the cost of shipping more than 13,000 health kits that Minnesota churches assembled and prepared, International Child Care in the Dominican Republic received 40 percent, and Volunteers in Mission scholarships received 10 percent. The 2017 Annual Conference theme is "Encounter the Spirit: Live Expectantly" and funds from this year's Love Offering will go to three projects:

United Methodist University of Sierra Leone—School of Applied Health Sciences



Recipient of 60 percent of 2017 Love Offering

Sierra Leone has one of the lowest life expectancies in the world, and one in every five children die before their fifth birthday. The vast majority of the country's citizens don't have access to health services, and there is an acute shortage of trained health professionals. This portion of the Love Offering will be used to expand United Methodist University of Sierra Leone by creating a School of Applied Health Sciences in the city of Bo. Funds may be used for rehabilitating an existing classroom building, hiring staff, preparing a curriculum, and purchasing materials. The school will be adjacent to United Methodist-affiliated Mercy Hospital, where students will receive practical, hands-on training. Midwives, nurses, community health officers, and technicians who graduate from this new institution will significantly improve the accessibility and quality of health care throughout Sierra Leone.

Emma Norton Services

Recipient of 30 percent of 2017 Love Offering

Emma Norton Services helps women, children, and families achieve victory over homelessness, mental illness, and chemical dependency. The Twin Cities-based nonprofit provides safe, affordable housing through Emma Norton Residence, which supports 50 women in transition at any given time, and Emma's Place, which houses 13 families on a permanent basis. In addition to housing, Emma Norton Services provides case management, peer and individual support programs, youth programs, life skills and out-of-poverty training, mental health support, and advocacy for women with disabilities. Through Emma Norton Services, families receive resources and coaching to equip them on their path toward stability.

Volunteers in Mission Scholarships

Recipient of 10 percent of 2017 Love Offering

Mission trips transform the lives of participants by giving them an opportunity to grow in faith and gain a new perspective of the world. Through the United Methodist Church's Volunteers in Mission program, teams spend up to two weeks working on mission projects domestically or abroad. Most teams from Minnesota are engaged in hands-on projects that build infrastructure to ensure that nutritional, medical, and educational programs in developing countries become sustainable and locally run. Team members pay their own way, and the Love Offering helps offset the cost for first-time participants.

Expanding our view of service

We often think of serving in terms of Matthew 25: supplying food and clothing; caring for the sick, incarcerated and other “least of these” members of society — serving Jesus in the process. But we also can serve him with our unique talents and by doing things we love.

For example, Ged King, a barber in England, devotes some of his time off to giving homeless people free haircuts. Imagine Jesus saying, “For my hair was long and scraggly, and you cut it” — or “My heart was lonely, and you played music to lift my spirits. I could no longer read small print, and you read to me. I have to work two jobs, and you invited my child to spend afternoons crafting with you. My car broke down, and you repaired it.” Then the King will say, ... “Come, you who are blessed by my Father ... whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me” (Matthew 25:34, 40, NIV; emphasis added).

Steps on the Journey



A few weeks ago we celebrated Easter. Many times we think of this as a once a year occurrence. But the truth is every Sunday should be an Easter celebration. Actually every day should be an Easter celebration.

Easter is not about once a year remembering that God raised Jesus from the dead and brought new life but we need to be reminded every week, every day that God continues to bring new life to each of us. The Easter Sunday celebration helps re-focus our lives around the fact that we are Easter people, we are people who believe resurrection is possible.

In a world that at moments seems to think that death is the only thing possible we are reminded that God and God's Spirit are still at work. Easter people focus on what God is doing. Sometimes it seems way too slow. We want it to go faster. But God will work at God's own speed and we are invited to be part of that experience.

Teilhard de Chardin, a French philosopher and Jesuit priest, put it this way: "Above all, trust in the slow work of God. We are quite naturally impatient to reach the end without delay. We should like to skip the intermediate stages. We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new. And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stage of instability—and that it might take a very long time. Above all, trust in the slow work of God."

As Easter people we need to watching and participating with the work of God. As slow as it may seem at time, trusting in God and remembering that today is Easter with all its resurrections we can move forward on the journey taking one more step.

Expanded lives

In a fascinating, kid-friendly science experiment, a bar of Ivory soap heated in a microwave writhes and expands into a unique, billowy shape. The change is due to Charles' Law, which describes how a gas, such as that contained in pockets inside a bar of Ivory, expands as its temperature increases. The soap can still be used as normal, though it's now fragile and flaky.

How Does Our Garden Grow?

We're getting ready for the 2017 version of **Faith UMC's Neighbors' Food Shelf Garden**. Soon you'll see straw bales appear and the raised garden boxes fill with soil. Planting will begin in mid-May, when we are assured that frost is not in the forecast.

Last year, our garden plus donations from members' "satellite" gardens more than doubled the highest previous yield in six years (530 pounds of veggies — beans, cucumbers, egg plants, herbs, lettuce, peppers, potatoes, squash and tomatoes) with an estimated market value of \$1,330. This year's garden will include even more tomatoes and herbs, which are very expensive to purchase in grocery stores.



What you need:

- An old shirt
- Tempura paint (brown, dark pink, light pink and white)
- Paintbrush
- Light blue or white construction paper
- A paper plate
- Q-tips
- Paper towels



What you do:

1. Roll up one sleeve and paint your arm and the palm of your hand brown.
2. Lengthwise on the paper, carefully place your painted arm and hand, with fingers spread apart. (This is the tree trunk and branches.)
3. Place the other paint colors on the plate.
4. Using Q-tips, place dots of paint (blossoms!) all over the branches.
5. When dry, display your tree — or give it as a Mother's Day gift.
