Pie Sale Sunday, May 5



2013 Love Offering

Each year, Minnesota Annual Conference churches take a Love Offering for missions. The offering benefits international, national, and local mission projects, and helps fund Volunteer in Mission scholarships. Explore the 2013 conference theme, "Unleashing Bold Spirit-Leaders," by giving to these ministries that support emerging leaders in Minnesota and around the world.

International

Women & Community Association — 25 Percent

The Women and Community Association is an ecumenical ministry that serves approximately 12,000 people in a large, impoverished, rural county in Nicaragua. United Methodist missionaries Nan McCurdy and Miguel Mairena serve at this mission site.

- Love Offering funds will be used to support youth scholarships for college, high school, and primary school students from impoverished families in remote villages. The high school students tutor grade school children in their villages in order to give back to the community. Workshops are also held for parents.
- Youth Network Against Violence. Some 350 youth receive training each year to become leaders in their villages on issues such as prevention of violence and sexual abuse, promotion of gender equity, reproductive health, the environment, and citizen participation.
- Women's Economic Development includes training for small businesses or cattle-raising and loans of \$100 to \$500.

National

Red Bird Missionary Conference — 20 Percent

Financial assistance is desperately needed to help pay the conference's pastors in impoverished areas in Appalachia. Previously, missionaries served these churches, and were supported through the General Board of Global Ministries. Now with indigenous area pastors, these small churches in the mountains struggle to meet basic needs. There are 24 United Methodist churches with 13 pastors sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ and providing people with hope and guidance.

Emma Norton Services — 20 percent

Emma Norton Services is the only United Methodist National Mission Institution in Minnesota. With our support, women, children, & families are given hope for a brighter future. In 2012, over 100 women and more than 20 families with some 90 children had a safe place to call home. At Emma Norton Services, women receive help to maintain sobriety, manage their mental health, finish their education, enroll in job training programs or college, get jobs, and build a healthy social support network. The children at Emma's Place are able to attend school regularly and have a chance for a healthy, productive life. ENS's "Getting Ahead" program helps women become self-sufficient, develop their potential as leaders in their communities, and become better parents.

Minnesota

Native American Ministries in Minnesota — 25 percent

- All Feathers Ministry Inc. is a non-profit ministry located on the site of the former Cass Lake United Methodist Church. A ministry
 overseen by the Minnesota Conference Native American Ministry Action Team, the In-dah-so Gwaa-nib Spiritual and Community
 Ctr. provides worship, youth and children's ministry, and is also used for other programs and community gatherings. This project
 is directed by James Allen, a spiritual leader in the Leech Lake tribe. Other NAMAT ministries include the annual Native American spiritual retreat for adults and families and the weekly Deer River United Methodist Church Teen Night program for local
 Indian youth.
- NAMAT has entered into an ecumenical arrangement with Episcopal, Lutheran, and Presbyterian judicatiories to develop a
 ministry to Native people living in St. Paul. An Episcopal Native American minister has been hired to explore and develop an
 ongoing ministry presence in the east metro area.

Volunteers In Mission Scholarships — 10 Percent

Lives are changed forever when volunteers become involved in service to others. United Methodist Volunteers in Mission promotes, encourages, and enables Christians to exemplify Christian love in action through short-term mission service at home and abroad. The Love Offering provides scholarships for those participating in a VIM project and support for training for team leaders.

Relief Kits

Bishop Bruce R. Ough is challenging Minnesota United Methodists to prepare **5,000 cleaning buckets** to replenish those used by United Methodist Committee on Relief for those recovering from hurricanes Isaac and Sandy. Spiritual Practice

Listening is an art, a spiritual practice...

W hy is listening so important? Listening speaks to one of our deepest needs: to be understood or to feel understood. Yes, we might like people to agree with us, take our side, but it is a great gift when we feel that the person understands us, even if the person does not agree with us. It shows the person cares. It develops trust. It connects us.

Listening acknowledges and honors the other's uniqueness with his or her own stories and truths. We each need to tell our story, and many ways the greatest gift of listening is that it enables us to go deeper into our own stories. Often I don't know what I think until I hear what I say.

... Listening, which includes asking questions, can lead the other person to greater understanding and clarity about themselves.

Listening is important to the person speaking, but it is also important to the listener.

... Listening creates the possibility of learning and being changed, enriching our lives. If we do not listen, our creativity, flexibility, and ability to grow and learn is diminished, our universe is diminished. Through listening, we can understand how we have harmed another, and also how we can make things right. Hearing has consequences, and these consequences can be redemptive.

Believing that we experience God in the flesh, incarnate in life, we can acknowledge that God speaks to us through the other. We, therefore, need to listen for God's voice in the other, who is created in the image of God.

~ LISTENING PRACTICES ~

1. Create the space for listening. We first need to create the space for being attentive, mentally and physically, to what the other has to say. The mental space is the most important-a space within ourselves, a space that is open and receptive and caring. This involves prayerful preparation if the conversation is a difficult one. When time does not allow for this preparation, we can suggest a time when we are able to be mentally and physically present. The most important part of the physical space is what we create with our own presence and body language, including an open posture and a welcoming tone of voice

2. Ask good questions. A good question is open-ended and builds on what has been said; it takes the person deeper into their story. In the early stages of a conversation, these questions might be primarily clarifying questions, questions for understanding. As a conversation progresses, good questions open up more aspects of a person's story, the deeper levels of the story.

3. Summarize and paraphrase. Simply summarizing or paraphrasing what you have heard is a good way to make sure you are hearing correctly and to show others they have been heard. Paraphrasing puts what the other person said into your own words. You say what you have heard and ask if you have stated the concern, emotion, or content correctly. Recognize the emotions as well as the words.






