Steps on the Journey

When we were working through our values and vision last year, one of the things we said was important to us was the opportunity for people to grow in their faith. We want people to move and enlarge their understanding of their lives, the Bible and their relationships with God and one another. We recognized that faith is a process we engage in all our lives that God moves us towards perfection in love.

To help support this value we remind ourselves of the opportunities already part of our life together. We have the adult Sunday School class, sanctuary choir, men's breakfast, United Methodist Women, Sunday School for the children & youth, confirmation and short term opportunities. This next year we are looking at three new opportunities to offer to the congregation.

The first is a Bible reading group. This group would meet together for $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 hours and read out loud a book of the Bible. This would be a way for use to hear the flow of the story rather than the pieces we hear on Sunday morning. We would all use the same translation. There would not be preparation in advance or homework from the group. This will allow us to follow the faith journey each book invites us to take.

The second group will be "Graceful Journey". This will be a chance to look at end-of-life issues. Whether they are issues we ourselves or someone we love are facing, these modules will give us some of the tools we need. This will be a 4 week series taking place after Christmas.

The third group is a movie & discussion group. The group will meet 4-6 times during the year. We will gather and watch a movie together and then have a discussion about it. Sometimes it might be a theatrical production, other times it may be a documentary or a television production.

All of these are open to anyone in the congregation. No times or dates have been set, so if you are interested in any of these please contact me with your preferences. If you have questions please feel free to talk to me.

As we continue on the journey we grow in our faith.



Will you help maintain the church lawn yet this summer?





Lovingly Fitted

King Solomon made himself and enclosed litter of wood from Lebanon. He made its columns of silver, its roof of gold, its seat of purple cloth, its interior lovingly fitted. —Song of Songs 3:9-10, New American Bible

Several years ago my husband and I were praying *lectio divina*, using the passage above, and the words "lovingly filled" shimmered forth for me from the text.

The theme for me this summer, as I have had a sabbatical from teaching, has been sustainability. How do I continue to nourish the work I am doing and flourish in the process? What are the things to say "no" to, so that I might have more space for the fullness of blossoming? What are the essential practices that cultivate joyfulness in this work?

When I read the words "lovingly fitted," I had to take pause. In the passage it is referring to Kim Solomon's litter, which is a kind of seat or throne. But as I prayed with the words and let them stir my imagination, I found myself invited to ponder the ways God wants my life "lovingly filled" for me. What I think this means, in part, is not living someone else's live or another person's expectations of what I thing I "should" be doing.

"Lovingly fitted" speaks to me of taking great time and care to craft something that fits a person just so. How might I craft my days with such joy, attentiveness, reverence, and love for my own abundant gifts? What if each day were a throne, a royal seat, and holy tabernacle?

And it is not just me doing the fitting. I do it by listening to the Source of all wisdom within. I listen for the thrumming beat of love and what makes my heart pound more loudly.

How do I "lovingly fit" my days? How do I craft my book of days so that generosity can be poured forth?... Hand in hand with these questions, begs the question of all the ways we sabotage our own best efforts, when we take on things to please others, or not disappoint them, or we continue doing what has brought us joy in the past without realizing that things have gently shifted, and our souls are ready and hungry for new nourishment and challenges...

For Hildegard of Bingen, and fundamental principle of discernment was *viriditas*—or the greening power of God. We are to seek out what most deeply nourishes us in both body and soul. What contributes to our flourishing is holy. What depletes us is not, so we can stop worshipping at the altar of busyness for the sake of appearing important or productive.

We can pause and ask ourselves, what would it mean to live as if my life were "lovingly fitted" for me? To believe that God does not demand us to contort our spirits into other people's versions of us, but to recognize our life task as living what is uniquely given to us?

May we encounter the greening of our souls in profound new ways, so as to bring that kind of vitality back to the world. May you find an abundance of greening moments revealed each day.






What you need:

RED ROCK CAMP MEETING

Newport United Methodist Church • August 10, 2014 • 3:00 p.m.

The first Methodist Mission in Minnesota began in 1837. Two years after the founding of the mission, the pastor in charge moved part of the mission to the east side of the Mississippi River near the famous Red Rock of the Sioux, a sacred granite boulder painted with red stripes and worshipped for generations by the Indians. Pastor Benjamin Kavanaugh built a two-story log cabin where the first floor served as a school for children and the upper level as the pastor's home.



In 1869 Red Rock became the site of Methodist camp meetings. John Holton donated 10 acres to the "Red Rock Camp Ground Association," which held meetings each July that drew single-day crowds of 20,000 people. Special steamboats and trains brought people from St. Paul twice a day. The camp meetings continued for decades in Newport.

Both the Red Rock and the restored cabin, the oldest Methodist building in Minnesota, can be seen on the ground of the Newport United Methodist Church. Red Rock Camp Meetings were held near this site for many years.

This August, the Red Rock Camp Meeting will be remembered and celebrated. Bishop Bruce Ough will speak at the Camp Meeting Service at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 10 — held at Newport United Methodist Church, 1596 11th Ave., Newport (the corner of Glen Road and 11th). Pastor John McEachran and the congregation of Newport UMC invite Minnesota United Methodists and the community to join this year's Red Rock Camp Meeting.
