#### **Five Kernels**

The Plymouth Pilgrims celebrated the first Thanksgiving Day in fall 1621, but by the next May, their food supply was depleted. The harvest of 1622 was a failure, and the Pilgrims often lived for days on just a few kernels of corn.

Amid a drought in 1623, the people sought divine intervention. After praying for nine hours on a hot July day, they were blessed with a two-week rainfall. Edward Winslow wrote, "It was hard to say whether our withered corn or drooping affections were most quickened and revived." The Pilgrims never went hungry again.

Start a Thanksgiving tradition by placing five kernels of corn at each place setting. Point out a blessing that each kernel represents. For example:

- 1. God loves us.
- 2. God provides for all our needs.
- 3. God gives us friends, just as the Indians befriended the Pilgrims.
- 4. God hears and answers our prayers.
- 5. God is preparing a place for us in heaven.

Then have family members share five things for which they're grateful.



### MAKE A DIFFERENCE

#### dif-fer-ence / drfərəns / [dif-er-uhns]

Financial struggles can seemingly come out of nowhere. They could be brought on by the loss of a job, a serious car crash or a health emergency. Individuals who always paid their bills on time can unexpectedly find themselves falling behind.

Thankfully, there are a slew of different groups trying to battle what may be the worst outcome of a sudden financial crisis: homelessness.

One group trying to help families all over the east metro is the St. Paul Area Council of Churches. Its Project Home initiative works with faith communities around the region, including West St. Paul, Maplewood, Roseville and St. Paul, to offer 40 beds of emergency shelter. When the outreach program began in 1997, no one envisioned it would still be needed 17 years later or what a crucial role it would play in the social safety net.

The Ramsey County Department of Human Services and Metropolitan Interfaith Council on Affordable Housing (MICAH) now work closely with the St. Paul Area Council of Churches to provide an "overflow" system when the countywide homeless shelters can't house everyone.

When Project Home started, most of the homeless shelters offered single night stays for individuals. Little was available for parents and children who suddenly found themselves homeless. Today there are more facilities geared toward families, but they never seem to have quite enough beds available to serve everyone needing temporary shelter.

Some shelters only house single parents; others only accept female domestic violence victims. While those serve a significant purpose, Project Home is about serving the needs of families.

The Project Home staff work with faith communities to provide overnight, emergency housing in church fellowship halls and school cafeterias, and synagogue classrooms for brief periods of time. Volunteers from the faith groups serve meals and provide overnight supervision. "It is a great opportunity to provide a chance for regular folks and congregations around the community to go face-to-face with homelessness," he said. "...Nothing dispels stereotypes more than just being down (at a temporary shelter) and talking to somebody."

According to the Project Home website, the organization worked with 24 faith communities in 2013 and 4,071 volunteers. It provided overnight shelter to 617 families, with about 60% of the children being age 5 and younger.

Salem Lutheran Church in West St. Paul is the site of Project Home for January 2 until February 2. They are in need of help with the meals in the evening, helping the children and people who would stay overnight.
