The shell's unique characteristics call to mind Christ's birth and death: the poinsettia- and lily-like images, holes representing the four nails and spear that pierced Jesus, small bones inside the shell resembling doves and thus symbolizing the Holy Spirit.

## MAKE A DIFFERENCE · EBOLA Response ·

Since June 2014, the Global Health unit and the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), both of the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church, have been working together to coordinate an integrated response to the Ebola epidemic in West Africa. To date, they have ensured that grants totaling more than \$500,000 for educational programs, protective equipment, and other Ebola-related supplies have been provided to the health boards in Sierra Leone, Liberia and Cote d'Ivoire and to other partners.

As the disease dynamic shifts from the crisis phase, it has become apparent that the epidemic already is having long-term negative impacts on the health systems, economies and social practices of these countries. Global Ministries' is shifting its Ebola focus from UMCOR's International Disaster Response unit to the Global Health unit. In doing so, we seek to enable a long-term approach that not only continues to address the Ebola epidemic but also works with the local church and other partners to strengthen healthcare capacity in West Africa.

#### Churches Play Important Role in Fighting Stigma

In West Africa, The United Methodist Church is helping communities prevent the spread of Ebola while offering compassion to those who are feeling stigmatized by the virus. Bishop Yambasu of Sierra Leone shared with the General Board of Global Ministries that during the passing of the peace, church members now place their hands on their hearts and bow to one another rather than embracing. Hand washing stations are also at the entrance of houses of worship.

In the U.S., many United Methodists have been in prayer with those in West Africa who are affected by the outbreak. When Ebola was identified in the U.S., concern grew that people from West Africa might be subject to stigma and discrimination.

Dr. Olusimbo Ige from Global Ministries' United Methodist Global Health unit said that the Center for Disease Control has stated that Ebola causes no significant threat to the United States. "Ebola is not an airborne disease," she said. "You can only get Ebola from: touching the blood or body fluids of a person who is sick with or who has died from Ebola; touching contaminated objects, like needles; or touching infected animals."

The Rev. Dr. J. Denise Honeycutt, who leads the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), encourages congregations to respond with love rather than fear. "There is no legitimate reason to limit interactions with people from West Africa," she said. "As people of faith, we are called to walk with our brothers and sisters, particularly those who might be grieving or concerned for their loved ones who are at risk in their home country." She added, "We want to welcome and care for others as Christ has done for us."

### A Summary of UMCOR's Response to Ebola Outbreak as of December 15, 2014

To date, Global Ministries has issued, through UMCOR, more \$500,000 in grants in response to the Ebola epidemic. Primary partners have been The United Methodist Church (UMC) health boards in Sierra Leone and Liberia, and grants also have been extended to other trusted partners, as detailed in the following:

### WORKING WITH THE UNITED METHODIST HEALTH BOARD IN LIBERIA, UMCOR HAS:

- Distributed 400 personal protection kits (PPE) to UMC facilities
- Provided funds to distribute supplies (including gloves and gowns) for UMC health facilities
- Provided 1,250 individuals with a month's supply of emergency food rations
- Trained 150 teachers as Ebola educators, provided 15 Ebola prevention kits, and educated 900 individuals in Ebola prevention in three communities
- Educated 25,000 individuals through the trained trainers and public announcement materials on Ebola
- Provided emergency food assistance to 350 vulnerable people
- Provided 10,000 vulnerable individuals with emergency 1-month rations to cover food needs during the disruption of normal activities caused by Ebola
- Trained 150 teachers as Ebola educators in 3 communities. WORKING WITH GLOBALMEDIC, LIBERIA, UMCOR HAS:
- Provided 38,000 face masks, 3,800 protective suits and 60,000 pairs of gloves
- Provided essential medicines
- Provided (5) pop-up tents for use as overflow or holding units. WORKING WITH ACT ALLIANCE IN LIBERIA, UMCOR HAS SUPPORTED:
- Training for 70 beneficiaries to make them trainers on Ebola virus outbreak awareness / sensitization of preventive measures
- Workshops for 960 beneficiaries on Ebola virus outbreak awareness and preventive measures.

#### WORKING WITH YWCA, LIBERIA, UMCOR HAS SUPPORTED:

- Identification and support of 200 girl survivors of Ebola
- Provided 50 girl survivors with food support and hygiene kits WORKING WITH THE UNITED METHODIST HEALTH BOARD IN SIERRA LEONE. UMCOR HAS:
- Provided health facilities materials to prevent contagion
- Constructed a holding unit at Mercy Hospital
- Distributed 400 PPE to UMC health facilities
- Trained 200 health workers on Ebola
- Provided public awareness messages to impacted communities
- Purchased supplies for UMC health facilities in Sierra Leone.

### WORKING WITH GLOBALMEDIC, SIERRA LEONE, UMCOR:

- Provided 38,000 face masks, 3,800 protective suits and 60,000 pairs of gloves
- Provided essential medicines
- Provided (5) pop-up tents for use as overflow or holding units. WORKING WITH YWCA IN SIERRA LEONE, UMCOR HAS:
- Identification and support of 200 girl survivors of Ebola
- Provided 50 girl survivors with food support and hygiene kits. WORKING WITH THE UNITED METHODIST HEALTH BOARD IN COTE D'IVOIRE, UMCOR HAS:
- Implemented a public awareness campaign within UMC institutions
- Purchased supplies for UMC health facilities in Cote d'Ivoire.
