Justice and Compassion Mission Trip

Youth and adults from across the conference are invited to participate in this nine-day adventure to our nation's capital and the Ohio River Valley.

We will travel in vans to Washington, D.C. (staying overnight in a Toledo church) for two days of learning seminars on immigration and racism by General Board of Church and Society, plus



visits with dignitaries, Minnesota legislators, museums, and touring. Then we will travel to Steubenville, Ohio for three days of urban mission in the Ohio River Valley. Accommodations in Washington, D.C. are pending; sleeping arrangements in Ohio are dorm rooms with bunk beds.

Cost is \$400 per person plus incidentals. Scholarships are available - do not let the expense keep you away. High school age youth and older are welcome. Come yourself or bring a group from your church. Space is limited to 40 people. A commitment of \$75 required to confirm your spot.

SUMMER READ

This summer we will have a reading group every other Monday beginning on June 12. We will be reading "We Know How This Ends: Living While Dying" by Bruce Kramer & Cathy Wurzer. You do not need to attend every time, but come as you can. Below is a description of the book:

2010 had been a very good year for Bruce H. Kramer. But what began as a floppy foot and leg weakness led to a shattering diagnosis: he had amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. ALS is a cruel, unrelenting neurodegenerative disease where the body's muscles slowly weaken, including those used to move, swallow, talk, and ultimately breathe. There is no cure; ALS is a death sentence.

When death is a constant companion, sitting too closely beside you at the dinner table, coloring your thoughts and feelings and words, your outlook on life is utterly transformed. The perspective and insights offered in We Know How This Ends reveal this daily reality and inspire a way forward for anyone who has suffered major loss and for anyone who surely will. Rather than wallowing in sadness and bitterness, anger and denial, Kramer accepted the crushing diagnosis. The educator and musician recognized that if he wanted a meaningful life, embracing his imminent death was his only viable option. His decision was the foundation for profound, personal reflection and growth, even as his body weakened, and inspired Kramer to share and teach the lessons he was learning from ALS about how to live as fully as possible, even in the midst of devastating grief.

At the same time Kramer was diagnosed, broadcast journalist Cathy Wurzer was struggling with her own losses, especially the slow descent of her father into the bewildering world of dementia. Mutual friends put this unlikely pair—journalist and educator—together, and the serendipitous result has been a series of remarkable broadcast conversations, a deep friendship, and now this book.

Written with wisdom, genuine humor, and down-to-earth observations, We Know How This Ends is far more than a memoir. It is a dignified, courageous, and unflinching look at how acceptance of loss and inevitable death can lead us all to a more meaningful and fulfilling life.

How Does Our Garden Grow?

Faith UMC's Neighbors' Food Shelf Garden is now planted. Twelve straw bales house tomatoes and potatoes. Raised boxes are home to pole beans, cucumbers, squash and a colorful variety of peppers. The garden cart on wheels holds romaine lettuce and purple and yellow bush beans. Our three "onion rings" contain onions, of course; and an assortment of herbs emerge from a miscellaneous collection of pots, hanging baskets and other containers. And let's not forget the flowers, which add a little pizzazz to whole package.

Last year's garden project yielded 530 pounds (more than double the highest previous yield) with an estimated market value of \$1,330. With more plants this time (and another ideal mix of warmth, sunshine and rain), we hope to have another record year.

"The little white church" in Inver Grove Heights, when formed in 1857 as Salem Evangelical Church, was the state's first congregation of the Evangelical Association of North America. Parishioners met in another nearby location until the building was built in 1875.
