September and all it brings is just around the corner. Suddenly all our schedules get busier, young people are going back to school, whether it is kindergarten for the first time, entering middle school, becoming a freshman in high school or college, activities are begun that were put on hold for the summer.

Before we move into the fall schedule I want us to pause and think about everything that happened here at Faith. In June we recognized our graduating seniors, celebrating endings and new beginnings. We began our Friday evenings at Covington Court, seeing people we have seen previous years and meeting new friends.

In July we gave away water and cookies to celebrate national sugar cookie day. It was a warm day and there were many smiles and thanks for the water and cookies. We spent time at Garlough School making sure everyone had breakfast and lunch. Hats, food, laughter and sharing – what more do you need. Our evening at Covington Court meant serving food in the rain but people are always hungry.

August found us celebrating chocolate chip cookie day with the people of the Sanctuary. Laughter, cookies and a good time were had by all. We had a pilot project for the outdoor task force with fire-roast pizza and s'mores in the yard. We had neighbors come from down the block and from other communities. I met one woman and her daughter; as we talked she shared that she also watches for events at our

church because they are always fun and well done. But the highlight of the summer for me was our Friday evening at Covington Court. I had challenged you early in the summer to gather 75 backpacks for the kids at Covington. We gathered 87. We brought them out after supper and parents and kids gathered around. The youth and their parents left with huge smiles on their faces. One grandmother walked up to me and wanted to know who we were and why we had done this. I shared that we were from the church down the street and we did it because the people of Covington were important because they were children of God. She grabbed my hand and told me she had just moved into Covington. She now had 3 grandchildren living with her. She had been trying to figure out how to get backpacks for the children for school and there they were. She hugged and thanked me and said we were an answer to prayer.

That is the reason we do these things in the community – to be someone's answer to prayer, to help someone smile and laugh and to remind each person we meet that they are important and a child of God.

It is one more step on our journey of faith together.

FLU CLINIC in October

On **Sunday**, **October 14** from 10:30 a.m. until noon **Cub Pharmacy will offer a flu vaccination clinic here at Faith.** Please bring your health insurance card, so Cub Pharmacy can bill your insurance company for the cost of the flu shot. If your insurer does not cover the cost of the vaccination when billed, Cub Pharmacy will pay for the cost. Ages 6 and older may be vaccinated. Ages 65 and older are eligible for the high-dosage vaccination.

Conversations on a Way Forward

Last fall, Bishop Ough hosted 15 different Conversations on A Way Forward across the Dakotas-Minnesota Area. They were attended by over 1,000 lay and clergy members. Again this fall, Bishop Ough will host a series of gatherings across the Area to continue the Conversations on A Way Forward as the denomination prepares for the special session of General Conference on February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis. All interested persons are invited to participate. However, Bishop Ough encourages lay and clergy members of Annual Conference, local church lay leaders and key local church leaders, in particular, to attend.

These gatherings are timely for the following reasons:

• The members of the Commission on a Way Forward have completed their work, and their report has been submitted to the Commission on General Conference.

• The Council of Bishops has endorsed the One Church Plan.

Other petitions related to the Commission's report will be available to the General Conference delegates and the church by this fall. In addition to information about the proposals that will be before the delegates to the 2019 General Conference, the gatherings will provide a setting in which to share resources and tools for how to facilitate dialogue and build resiliency in local churches.

In preparation for the gatherings, Bishop Ough encourages persons & congregations to read *Anatomy of Peace* by the Arbinger Institute and *God Unbound* by Elaine A. Heath. Bishop Ough also encourages all United Methodists to participate in the denomination-wide prayer vigil, <u>Praying Our Way Forward.</u>

Living in Faith

October Mission Well

The Tabernacle at Koronis Ministries in Paynesville has been part of people's lives for over 90 years at the retreat center. Thousands of people have gathered and dedicated their lives to Christ in the historic structure built in 1922. But needs have changed dramatically over the past century. As building standards, technology, expectations of camp groups, and the use of the facility evolved, they created needs that the building could no longer accommodate. The historic Tabernacle had no restrooms, air conditioning, ceiling fans, or heat, and it wasn't able to be used year-round. Years of use had resulted in a leaking roof and a cracked foundation that cause water to puddle inside.

The beloved Tabernacle was razed in spring 2015—and a capital campaign for a new Tabernacle began. Plans have come together for a new year-round, multi-level, multi-use worship and meeting center overlooking Lake Koronis with capacity for more than 300 people. The new Tabernacle will be available year-round with state-of-the-art technology, modern amenities, and full accessibility. Groundbreaking on the new building is slated for Labor Day, 2018.

Koronis is on the verge of building its new Tabernacle (with unfinished space on the bottom floor for a future dining room), but churches' and individuals' help is needed to bring it to fruition. Through the generosity of individual donors and the <u>2013 sale of Camp</u> <u>Kingswood</u>, \$1.6 million has already been promised toward this \$2 million project, but another \$400,000 is needed to make it happen. Each congregation is asked to designate a time to help raise money for the new Tabernacle with a goal raising \$1,500 per church.

Koronis has been a part of Faith's camping history. Before it was a United Methodist Camp it was the E.U.B. camp for Minnesota. The October mission offering will go to the Koronis Tabernacle Fund.

Solar Oven Partners UMC



Solar Oven Partners, working through the Volunteers in Mission shares solar ovens in places where historical and current social, political and economic forces have forced people to live with financial adversity, exposure to things detrimental to health and a ravaged natural environment. Volunteers bring the ovens and instruction on how to assemble and use them.

Solar Oven partner with a regional church body who connects us to the individual churches and communities where we will hold our solar cooking seminars. It is important that the local and regional church leadership provide the seminar leadership for continuing learning after the volunteers leave.

The reduced need to purchase cooking fuel can save a family significant funds day after day, year after year. We provide the ovens with generous donations. But the oven recipients contribute approximately 10% of the cost of the ovens. This assures that they have understood the value that the oven will add to their lives, and that they will care for it, and provides pride of ownership. It also provides the funds for the indigenous church to follow up and to bring this ministry to other communities when VIM teams leave.

Solar ovens are used on Native American reservations in the United States, various parts of Africa, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico and Haiti as well as other parts of the world.

The cost of one oven is approximately \$150.
