## What happened at the last General Conference in St. Louis and where are we headed as the United Methodist Church?

Special Congregational Forum • Sunday, June 2 10:40 a.m. • Faith UMC Fireside Room.

A special called General Conference of the UMC met February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis to "find a way forward on the issue of human sexuality and church unity with the goals of ending distracting and mission-compromising disagreement about how to be in ministry with Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Intersex, Queer/Questioning people." The conference received the final report of "The Commission on a Way Forward" which recommended a "One Church Plan". In addition to this plan, three other plans were considered: "The Connectional Conference Plan, The Traditional Plan and The Simple Plan".

We'll talk about what happened at the conference, what was finally approved, and how this impacts the church. In addition to the meeting of this Special General Conference, the Judicial Council met in April to review all the actions taken by this Special General Conference – we'll talk about their decisions and how all of this is now reflected in the new Book of Discipline of the UMC. Since April, several groups have met across MN and the nation to talk further about how we view human sexuality, the unity of the church and what possible futures may lay ahead. In less than a year from now, the General Conference of the Church will meet again from May 5-15th, 2020 here in Minneapolis at the Convention Center. We have asked Rev. Dennis Alexander to present this information and to take any questions we may have.

#### **SUMMER READ 2019**

This summer we will have a reading group every other Monday beginning on June 10. We will be reading "The Second Mountain: The Quest for the Moral Life" by David Brooks. You need not attend every time, but come as you can. Below is a description of the book:

Everybody tells you to live for a cause larger than yourself, but how exactly do you do it? The author of *The Road to Character* explores what it takes to lead a meaningful life in a self-centered world.

Every so often, you meet people who radiate joy—who seem to know why they were put on this earth, who glow with a kind of inner light. Life, for these people, has often followed what we might think of as a two-mountain shape. They get out of school, they start a career, and they begin climbing the mountain they thought they were meant to climb. Their goals on this first mountain are the ones our culture endorses: to be a success, to make your mark, to experience personal happiness. But when they get to the top of that mountain, something happens. They look around and find the view . . . unsatisfying. They realize: This wasn't my mountain after all. There's another, bigger mountain out there that is actually my mountain.

And so they embark on a new journey. On the second mountain, life moves from self-centered to othercentered. They want the things that are truly worth wanting, not the things other people tell them to want. They embrace a life of interdependence, not independence. They surrender to a life of commitment.

In *The Second Mountain*, David Brooks explores the four commitments that define a life of meaning and purpose: to a spouse and family, to a vocation, to a philosophy or faith, and to a community. Our personal fulfillment depends on how well we choose and execute these commitments. Brooks looks at a range of people who have lived joyous, committed lives, and who have embraced the necessity and beauty of dependence. He gathers their wisdom on how to choose a partner, how to pick a vocation, how to live out a philosophy, and how we can begin to integrate our commitments into one overriding purpose.

In short, this book is meant to help us all lead more meaningful lives. But it's also a provocative social commentary. We live in a society, Brooks argues, that celebrates freedom, that tells us to be true to ourselves, at the expense of surrendering to a cause, rooting ourselves in a neighborhood, binding ourselves to others by social solidarity and love. We have taken individualism to the extreme—and in the process we have torn the social fabric in a thousand different ways. The path to repair is through making deeper commitments. In *The Second Mountain*, Brooks shows what can happen when we put commitment-making at the center of our lives.

#### **How Does Our Garden Grow?**

Our 9th annual
Neighbors, Inc. Food
Shelf Garden is planted!
In straw bales and raised
soil beds, carts, and pots,
we've plant tomatoes,
green beans, cucumbers,
peppers, squash, onions
and lots of herbs. New
this year is Malabar spinach, a vitamin-rich climbing vine that is both orna-



mental and edible. And you may find one or two new vegetables in the "experimental" section—got to keep trying new things. Last year, our garden produced 426 pounds of vegetables. With the addition of green beans, egg plants, peppers, tomatoes, and zucchini from individual's "satellite" gardens, we delivered 435 pounds of vegetables to Neighbors and set a record of \$1,500 for market value (average cost of vegetables from neighborhood grocery stores). Here's to another record-breaking year in 2019.

Our garden is completely funded through memorial gifts and designated contributions. Thanks to Paul Williams for once again transporting 20 straw bales from Gerten's. We protect the poor against brutal violence in the developing world: 1) Land Theft - For poor families, a house and a small patch of land are often their only source of shelter, food and desperately needed income. 2) Sex Trafficking - The nightmare of sex trafficking thrives when law enforcement cannot protect vulnerable children and women. 3) Police Abuse of Power -Poor people in the developing world are abused by corrupt police who extort bribes and brutalize innocent citizens. 4) Citizenship Rights Abuse - Worldwide, an estimated 12 million people are stateless—people who hold no citizenship of any kind. No citizenship means no country claims you. No justice system protects you. 5) Sexual Violence Against Children - Sexual violence is a truly global epidemic that leaves millions around the world terrified in their homes, schools and neighborhoods. 6) Forced Labor Slavery - Forced labor slavery uses deception, threats or violence to coerce someone to work for little to no pay.

"The little white church" in Inver Grove Heights, when formed in 1857 as Salem Evangelical Church, was the state's first congregation of the Evangelical Association of North America. Parishioners met in another nearby location until the building was built in 1875.

Regular worship services there ended in 1910, but descendants of the church's founding families have kept traditions going. One of the annual rites, since 1999, is a Christmas Epiphany service held on the first Sunday in January; a Founders' Day service takes place on the first Sunday in June.

Old Salem Shrine will be holding an Open House (1:00 – 3:00) and Annual Founders Day Service (3:00) on Sunday, June 2.
